## High Schools

While only the seniors are involved – and oh, how involved – in the process of what comes after Melrose, the rest of us are just as interested in their experience. Our eighteen seniors have applied to sixteen different independent high schools, seven different parochial schools, as well as a few public schools. The latter two categories of schools have already spoken, and our students have been accepted into all the schools to which they applied, including one student to the prestigious Regis High School in NYC and one to the highly competitive Bergen Catholic in NJ! Iona Prep, Immaculate, Kennedy, Our Lady of Victory, Montfort Academy, Bergen Catholic, and Regis have welcomed our students with open arms. The independent schools will begin announcing their acceptances next month and extending through the second week in March. Our sincere congratulations are given to all who have already received acceptances.

## Shakespeare Returns to Mel rose

The 8<sup>th</sup> grade language arts students recently completed a Shakespearean unit on *Julius Caesar* and also wrote a sonnet. The students discovered the differences between an Italian sonnet and an English sonnet. They learned about meter, rhyme, and many poetic devices such as alliteration, allusion, simile, repetition, metaphor, personification, and onomatopoeia. Students were surprised to learn that even more recent poets such as Robert Frost wrote sonnets because he liked the challenge of writing poems to fit the specific sonnet rules. Students wrote their sonnets to include 14 lines, iambic pentameter, and a rhyme scheme of ABAB CDCD EFEF GG.

7<sup>th</sup> grade will soon begin reading a comedy, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* while 6<sup>th</sup> grade reads an all-time favorite, *Romeo and Juliet*.
